

Stump Protectors

A stump protector, also known as a removable rigid dressing, is a custom-made device that is commonly used after a new below-knee amputation.

A protector helps to:

- Protect the sensitive end of your residual limb from getting bumped
- Reduce the risk of rupturing the suture in case of a fall
- Keeps the knee straight, preserving range of motion essential for walking

Features:

- Removable allowing for inspection and cleaning of the wound as well as changing dressings
- Soft inner interface provides comfort
- Rigid outer provides protection from bumps and falls



How to put it on

- 1. <u>Put on the long thin sock</u> that was provided to you by your prosthetist. This makes it more breathable and prevents excess perspiration
- 2. <u>Undo all the straps</u>. Closing the Velcro on itself keeps it from getting tangled or catching on clothing
- 3. <u>Pull open the front flap</u>
- 4. <u>Slide your residual limb in</u>, making sure the curve of the plastic flap contours your knee once closed
- 5. <u>Attach all the Velcro straps.</u> The straps should be snug, but not uncomfortably so.

When to wear it

- When you are in your wheelchair and have your leg up on the amp board. This will keep it from getting bumped.
- In bed, wear it as much as possible. It can be taken off occasionally to move your leg around, do some exercises, and to work on de-sensitizing the limb and mobilizing the scar.
- When you are sleeping. For the first while it is advisable to try and wear it to bed in order to avoid a fall from getting out of bed in the middle of the night.
